Out of 332 dental colleges 292 belong to private sector and 40 are run by the government. According to National health profile (NHP) 2018 out of 2.7 lakh dentists, government employs only 2.7% (8). This is one of the reasons students remain unemployed. According to World Health Statistics 2019, the dentist population ratio is 1:10000. This shows that our country still shows increased demand for dentists. However unequal distribution of dentists in rural and urban areas plays an important role in increasing unemployment of the fellow dentists. Despite the increasing demand for dentists in our country according to the above data, saturation in the dental market can be noticed. It is because large number of dentists tends to practice in urban areas unlike in rural areas where not much dentists choose to practice. Lack of awareness of oral health in rural areas makes the private clinic less viable (5) (9) Analysing the about data, we can say that the upcoming students need to find solutions to survive in the market in order to have a successful future (10)
